Thanks for picking us up, and be sure to check out our annual Pride issue coming out in June



If The Daily Show's Jessica Williams had sex with Patti LaBelle their offspring would be a lot like Bob The Drag Queen. First name 'Bob', last name 'The Drag Queen', Bob is the comic creation of Christopher Caldwell and if she wins this season of RuPaul's Drag Race it will be an extra sweet victory, because she'll be the only other black person to have won since Tyra Sanchez back in Season Two.

A native of New York, Christopher's first appearance as Bob was on RuPaul's Drag Race, and since then she's blossomed into the nation's most irreverent queen. Her character is especially ironic considering how it came to be. "I was watching Season One and I thought I can do that!", she says.

"I'm a comedian not a drag perfectionist. A lot of people might not go on stage until everything is perfect, but I just don't care because it's not at all what I'm trying to do. My point in doing what I do is to be unique", she explains. These days, creating a point of difference as a drag performer is imperative, especially if you are going heel-to-heel with renowned drag legends. "I'm learning what it means to be a part of the international drag scene. It's one thing to be a local big deal, and even in New York that's pretty big, but you're still just a local girl", she mentions.

Almost overnight, Bob's schedule has exploded with performances in major cities around the globe, including Chicago, Seattle, South Beach, London, Glasgow and yes, oh yes even a few visits to our beloved Toronto, where she recently took stage at Fly 2.0 as part of Pride Toronto's #TeamBob campaign. Despite her globetrotting lifestyle Bob is keeping it humble and remains true to her original intentions of becoming a drag queen for the people, and says "I'm just trying to do two small things have fun and change the world."

On the latter point she continues to use her celebrity status to provoke change. Her performances

generally infuse politics as a way of directing the community's attention to issues that matter to her, like LGBT homeless youth, women, and the lived experiences of the trans community.

"A lot of queens don't want to mix politics into their shows, but I think it's important and if you're not part of the solution, then you are part of the problem. I know that sounds black and white. but the queer community can benefit by actively taking a closer look at ourselves. There's a lot that we can do, and as drag queens for example. we can start by looking at women's issues, what a trans woman has to go through, or a cis- gender woman for that

matter. There is just so much we can change for the better, and it starts with understanding one another. Especially for the guys; if you're not going to use your male privilege to stand up for somebody else, then you shouldn't even have it", she explains with only a hint of humour in her voice.

In keeping with Bob's mission to have fun, she's on the bill for the two day DragCon at the Los Angeles Convention Centre in May. The explosive success of last year's event attracted over 10,000 attendees. and this year will be bigger; with over 100 exhibitors, screenings/workshops and drag herstory discussion groups. "I'm really excited to be among all those fans. This is huge for me", she remarks. Bob will also be in among the dozens of notorious celebrity boundary pushers at the show

like Jeffree Star, Acid Betty, Big Dipper, Henry Rollins, James St. James and Trixie Mattel.

Bob's latest pet project is her Charity 4 The People Tour, which are charitable shows in cities where she's touring, and it's complemented by an online auction selling her outfits and memorabilia she's created and worn on RuPaul's Drag Race. With all proceeds benefitting local organizations, Bob has aggressive plans to raise at least \$40,000 by this coming DragCon, and another \$100,000 every year after that. Having only started a few weeks ago, she is well on her way to changing the world, one outfit at a time.







As frontwoman for celebrated local band LAL, bi-identifying artist Rosina Kazi has been on the forefront of the Toronto queer scene for the better part of two decades. Currently preparing for the April 29th release party of their new album Find Safety at Lee's Palace, Kazi is quick to explain that Toronto has offered her just as much as she has given back.

"I grew up in Brampton in the '80s and '90s - I've always known I was genderqueer, but it wasn't a language I was around." says Kazi in a phone interview. "I started understanding through language when I worked at the Toronto Women's Bookstore in



the early 2000s. I'd always been around the queer community with the band ,but the bookstore gave me a sense of myself I hadn't been able to find the words for. As I understood my queer side and who I was, our audience has grown as I've grown."

LAL's fan base has in fact grown so large that it's reached Kazi's front door, and Kazi, ever the good host, has let them in. She and her long-time bandmate/life partner Nicholas Murray bought a Bloordale warehouse space in 2009. Kazi, who is Bengali, re-evaluated her life priorities the next year after the death of her mother, and decided to turn their new home into a community venue.

She said, 'Let's organize shit for folks who don't have a lot of money, that's physically accessible, [that's for] queer folks of colour who just wanna have a show and dance, and not be harassed, or bothered with gender shit, whatever. We've built it all, it's all word of mouth besides Facebook. We're not promoters — we're space holders."



Unit 2, on Sterling Road, is a house for music — both local and "all kinds of queer POC bands from the states" - but also holds group-minded events, like a fundraising party for a patron's chest surgery. Additionally, for those who like their nights a little drier, the venue's Facebook page says that last month even hosted a sober party.

"It's about creating something that's more holistic. Each event is quite different, and we have a mix of people from the indigenous scene, the queer scene, a real hodgepodge of people coming together, artists who normally wouldn't come together, all dancing. When you dance ... you build trust in a different way. You can start to have harder conversations, hopefully, and build and bridge communities", Kazi explains.

LAL's long-awaited upcoming release, "Find Safety," builds and bridges sounds. The album is a heady melange of hip-hop, jazz, trip-hop, Bengali music, pop, and much more, making for a cohesive statement for dancing, chilling and thinking. The band

has been busy with recordings, live shows and other projects since 2012's independently-released eponymous album.

The years off have found the band - which has had up to six members in the past - returning to their roots as a duo of just Kazi and Murray. Those two will be joined by a LAL-family who's-who of special guests like Too Attached, Marshia Celina and DJ DurtyDabz at the Lee's Palace Show. The band hosted their first CD release party there 18 years ago, marking this a long-coming full circle accomplishment. "We've been around so long, and things have changed so drastically — we feel like a new band, which is amazing", Kazi confides.

Songs to watch for from the defiant and expansive Find Safety include lead single "Stand in my Way", opening track "Dead Happiness", and "Rules Were Meant to Be Broken" which is among Kazi's personal favourites. It was inspired by a trip to Berlin that saw the band, among other highlights, playing a party called "Pork" at the city's oldest gay club.

"It's about that feeling of coming out of the closet, feeling really great. Berlin's not just a queer haven, it's political. It's amazing to be around, and to be reminded of that. The song's not just about Berlin, but it started there and resonated. It's like a mantra for myself to just break the rules. I'm a bit of an anarchist, so it goes with my anarchist tendencies", Kazi proclaims.





SHE BEAT BY CAT GRANT

Our lives are filled with the grooves/ melodies and lyrics that become the soundtracks of our lives, set to the rhythm of the beat.

Our heart beats speed up in anticipation, when we see a special someone, and as queers we dance to the beat of a different drummer.

There is evidence from 6.000 years ago about using drums for communication played with bare hands. The first woman drummer I knew of was Karen Carpenter. There was also Maureen Ann "Moe" Tucker of Velvet Underground, and Sandy West of The Runaways. The 80's brought us Gina Schock (The Go Go's). Debbi Peterson (The Bangles), and of course the wonderful Sheila E. Women drummers were almost mandatory for the alternative 1990's, with Hole, White Stripes, The Donnas, and many more.

Toronto born Cathy Marchese gravitated towards drums by age 12. after studying music theory from the age 6 (playing clarinet and piano) at the Ontario Conservatory of Music. "The fact that I was using my entire body to play had something visceral about it", she explains. By 15 years old Cathy was playing underage in clubs before touring around the globe with numerous acts including a 6-year tenure with Jane Doe, and many amazing bands such as Random Order and Crackpuppy.

Although being a woman in rock, her musical inspirations are male, and include David Bowie and Led Zeppelin's, John Bonham, A career highlight was providing a soundtrack for a movie called 'A Short Film About Falling' by Peter Lynch, that was based on a concept by artist Max Roach. It was chosen as one of the featured shorts at the Toronto International Film Festival in 2007, and had its premiere at the Royal Ontario Museum.

Marchese says, "Another source of inspiration is seeing an elderly couple out and about holding hands. Not sure there's anything more incredible than seeing two people who probably have some of the most amazing stories to tell, together still, It's inspiring and beautiful." Cathy told me her mom is front row and centre inspiration because, "She's the strongest, most resilient, warmest person on the planet to me. She continues to support me no matter what."

The best part of playing live for her is the symbiosis between musician/audience members that happens when a show starts reaching certain levels of intensity. "I really start to feel a connection between myself and whoever's on the dance floor.



They're moving to the rhythm and sounds of the band. There's nothing hotter than that." Well except for maybe Cathy herself.

So what is the driving force that keeps Marchese banging on? "The mechanics behind each drum, the hardware, wood/ plastic/metal - different materials working together to make sound. How easily it is to force out a certain level of self expression through body movements in a rather confined space and limited amount of space, trapped on a drum seat sort of deal. Plus, the aggressive, LOUD aspect of the acoustics themselves, and they're fun", she exudes.

Her next project is Black and Blonde, with partner in crime singer/guitarist Carm Lamont, who Cathy describes as, "An awesome chick with great energy. We're currently in writing mode and the tunes are on the heavier side of the tracks raunch, aggression, loud and crazy."

She's also currently part of Grace, Toronto's own all female funk/soul band, bringing you R&B, funk, soul, disco, and a whole lotta love. You can catch the band at Eton House on the Danforth, April 30 2016, www.facebook.com/gracemusicTO/

How has married life changed the couples? Angie comments, "Emotionally our love is stronger than ever", while Katie and Shelby feel that there's a stronger sense of security, problems are shared and, "You become very protective of each other." Crystal sums it all up. "I feel that I am home no matter where we are, secure and very blessed to have my family."

On February 21, at the Rivoli on Queen Street West in Toronto, Scott Thompson and myself performed with our punk rock band "Mouth Congress" for the first time in 24 years! Why, most people would ask, would two old queers, who could be grandfathers, front a punk rock band now? And secondly, were they any good?

The answer to that second question is yeah, fucking yeah. We rocked our cocks off, as the yung'uns like to say. As to why, that is more complex. Back in our 20s, Scott and I were openly gay men dedicated to writing and performing comedy. I started the band in November of 1984, and we performed about a dozen shows over the next few years, and recorded over 600 songs... yes 600!

Then, Scott joined "Kids in the Hall", and the rest is history. The Kids went on to make a fabulous TV show, and "Mouth Congress" was all but forgotten. Then one day about five years ago, I started digitizing our old cassette tapes and playing the tracks for Scott. He suggested that we revive the band for one night only and shoot the whole thing for an upcoming documentary.

Easier said than done. It's hard, at the age of 56, to be performing punk music in front of a drummer bashing away, and amps throbbing with sound. Most mornings after rehearsals, I felt like I had been in a prize fight the night before.

Luckily, it all turned out just like we hoped. We performed our 12 songs and 11 costume changes in front of a capacity crowd, that was made up of people who were too young to ever see us perform in the 80s. They enjoyed our campy songs, like the one about a middle-aged housewife who learns how to strip



for her husband, and our cri-de-couer about the toll of AIDS. Then there was my solo about gerbilling (told from the gerbil's perspective), and Scott's heartfelt love song, called "Be My Hole".

Perhaps our most daring, and most easily misunderstood song is "She Male". Written in 1987, long before that term became politically incorrect, it combines fetish kink with the cartoon character of She-Ra, and depicts a vengeful deity with both a penis and a vagina who dare not be defied. We performed it in Wagnerian opera costumes. It probably only makes sense to us, but the crowd loved it anyway.

So that's what "Mouth Congress" was - a bold musical experiment celebrating the sexual diversity of the human condition. We were out gay guys playing with heterosexual musicians, and working in a field where gay men seldom tread.

Let this be an inspiration to any young gay man - you can have your own rock band. Rock N Roll is not just for straight boys and lesbians.

So to answer the real question on everyone's minds - did either Scott or myself ever get laid by a groupie? Nah. We only did it for the music, man.



Jade is also known as DJ Relentless. probably best known for a genre called Bitch Tracks (Underground Gay Urban Dance Music). 2016 has found Jade with three major single releases. "Karma" and "Scared Of Evolution" on Ber'lin Records, as well as her Canadian release "Come Get This Education" on Posse Up Records.

Boyd Kodak What have you been up to over the last year?

Jade Elektra It was a year of change as I found myself unemployed right before Christmas. So I regrouped and made a bold decision to focus on my dreams. I took it as an opportunity to start fresh for 2016 and give full attention to my recording career.

**BK** Which was the one most exciting event for you?

JE Most definitely shooting my first music video for "Karma" was exciting. Another highlight was to work with Canadian producers such as The Philthkids. We have one track out, but are working on more.

**BK** What are you looking forward to over for the next year?

JE I guess the catalog of my new tracks and a better resume of venues that I will have performed or DJ'd for. It is a great feeling to finally get to a point in your life when all of your past work actually means something, and people respect you for your ideas and contributions to the industry and community.

**BK** Where can we see your work?

JE I have just started a new dance party as DJ Relentless at The Duke Live.com in Leslieville called MIXOLOGY FRIDAYS. I'm looking forward to the challenges of reprograming and formatting this local watering hole into a place where everyone is welcome to come hit the dancefloor. I love bringing people together. My videos can be seen on YouTube, just google me.



**BK** Future plans?

JE I am currently working on a revue called FAUX GIRLS which will be a dinner and show at a restaurant in Leslieville. On a bigger horizon, my label in New York City, Ber'lin Records, feels I have enough material to produce a studio album as my alterego, Jade Elektra. So, I am really excited about that! Plus, my husband and I are continuing our event called POZ-TO.

BK Any message you would like to put out there?

JE All I can say is it all begins with you. It's as simple as the message was in "The Wiz" for Dorothy, "all you gotta do is believe in vourself". I dared to believe that I could do better and trust me. I've done even more than what I even imagined possible. Stop living in fear.

**BK** Finish the following sentence for us - The last thing I do before I go to sleep is...


JE Make sure that I am happy with the decisions I made that day. That's the only way to live a happy life.

# Pfor Lezervations



### "Feel free to pretend it's a secret lesbian society." Intrigued?

Well you should be, because this is how the minds behind Lezervations choose to promote their event, and believe me when I say they put the best in best-kept secret.

Having just wrapped its 11th event (only its second in Toronto). Lezervations is less of a secret and more of a growing phenomenon these days. Co-founder Isabelle Swiderski describes it best: "It's a series of social events where LBTO women can congregate in a setting that allows for conversation, typically those seeking something different than the club scene and the distant atmosphere of networking events."

That's how she and co-founder Dara Parker came up with the idea for Lezervations almost two years ago. "We started having conversations around where women like us might be," she says. "Women who are maybe mid-career, who have a network, who want to contribute, who want to give back, and who also want to build community and be more visible to each other"

A mutual love for dinner parties provided an answer and a business idea. Lezervations, a Canadian not-for-profit, was born, Vancouver, Toronto and San Francisco have all hosted the event, which is looking to expand to New York City, Miami. Seattle and Halifax in 2016. Montreal is also a potential future candidate, as are Paris and London, "Our vision is to have a global network."

Lezervations always partners with a local not-for-profit. In Toronto, they've joined forces with The 519 Church Street Community Centre. While these partnerships have been great, corporate sponsors are just as important. TD Bank is the event's sponsor in Vancouver and Toronto.

Held in restaurants that close down for the evening. Lezervations runs for three hours, with open networking at the beginning and end, and dinner and dessert in the middle. To encourage conversation, there's different assigned seating for the main course and dessert.

At its core, Lezervations is a mix of socializing and business networking, and it's been successful at this. In fact, according to Swiderski, couples have met through the event, and some women have even landed jobs because of new connections.

"I had a great time. It's a different opportunity to connect with a different crowd of people," says Kristina Flynn, who attended the first Toronto event."Lots of Bay Street was represented there, but one of the most interesting conversations I had was with a female firefighter", she recalls.

That said, there's no need to worry about cliques if you plan to attend. Swiderski says 50 per cent of attendees are new because she and Parker strongly encourage their guests to introduce Lezervations to others.

They have an ambassador in Flynn. "It would definitely be a priority for me to bring somebody new that hasn't experienced it so that they can get to see the positivity that I keep talking about."


