After her acting debut on Spike Lee's *Jungle Fever*, she garnered praise with Golden Globe nominations for the musical *Chicago*, the life story of HIV positive Ana Wallace in *Life Support*, and blues singer Bessie Smith in *Bessie*. On television she not only starred in her own talk show, but had a hit with *Living Single* for many years, and in the music world she has six Grammy nominations under her belt.

Her latest endeavour, *Star*, is a musical drama based in Atlanta that revolves around three talented singers. Latifah plays Carlotta Brown the owner of an Atlanta beauty salon. Her daughter Cotton on the show is played by Amiyah Scott, the second openly trans person to play a major recurring trans role on a scripted television series, after Laverne Cox (*Orange is the New Black*)

I had the opportunity to chat with Latifah about her latest television venture.

What drew you in to the character of Carlotta in the first place?

I think it was how much she's been through and how many mistakes she's made in life, but also how gifted she is at the same time. She's a character who is extremely flawed, who's been hurt, and who's made mistakes that have had dramatic consequences on her life and her future. She still has a huge capacity to love, and she never gives up. She still wanted to be redeemed in many ways. She's never all the way there, but she never gives up. Carlotta never stops trying. She never just completely gives in to one side. She always keeps

trying to challenge and grow and change, yet it doesn't necessarily look like it because she may play it real cool and calm sometimes, but she's always going through a lot underneath.

I think she's much more complicated and much more challenging for me as an actor to play than people might think, because there are so many layers underneath what Carlotta is feeling, that I have to find so many angles into her at all times. When Lee (Daniels) throws in twists and turns, which is always fun, I have to find more angles into her. It's fun, it's challenging, and it's exciting for an actor. I don't get bored doing it.

Can you talk about having a trans daughter on Star and what that has meant to you?

That was also one of the big draws of Carlotta, the fact that she has a trans daughter. Carlotta, completely different between Queen Latifah, but they cross over in certain ways. The topic of being trans or having a trans child, or becoming trans later in life, these things are very topical. More importantly, the thing that Lee and I talked about when we developed the concept of this show, and what we were interested in about this, was the fact that not everybody knows the right thing to say. It's a new experience for a lot of people, and if we could only communicate about it, we could grow to understand each other.

You'll find that theme along a lot of lines in this show, but this particular topic is very important to us, especially since our whole relationship to begin

this whole movement began after we were at the after-party for *Precious*. We kind of hung around and got on the topic of *Paris is Burning*, and how much we both loved that movie and how some of the people in that movie were high school classmates of mine, or friends that I knew from hanging out in the clubs in my teenage years. Lee kind of crossed a lot for the same places in his younger years, and we wanted to build on that understanding.

At the same time, you can't always fault people for what they don't understand. You always have to try to build a bridge. We wanted to show the conversation. We hear about those conversations, especially when Bruce Jenner became Caitlyn. It became a huge topic of conversation, and some of it was sort of trivialized, stereotyped or overblown, but what was missing was the actual conversation that was had to get from point A to point Z.

We wanted to show those actual conversations, what challenges people go through, what Cotton is feeling. Let's just start with what Cotton is feeling, and why Cotton feels this way, and what Cotton is going through. Then, let's deal with Carlotta and what she's feeling, and what she's going through, and how can a mother and child build a bridge between each other when they both love each other, but they're worlds apart on so many other things.

Those were the things that were important to us to really show, and not just show in one episode, but really to carry it through a whole season, carry it through a whole arc and really, really get down and dirty with it. Not just show the pretty sides of it, but show the uglier sides of it so that everybody can gain a better understanding on their own, and form their own opinions.

We're not trying to answer every question for everyone. We're just trying to show what the situation can really be like. I think that's a more interesting way to show it, rather than just say here's the perfect politically correct answer to everything, and let's go with that. Lee isn't afraid to tackle those subjects, which is why I love him, and because I'm not afraid to tackle those subjects either, especially when it's coming through the talent of his lens.

How much input did you put in for the wigs you wear on Star?

The idea definitely came from Lee. Carlotta is not a stereotype. She is someone we know, but the women we know love to spend time on their hair. Hair is very

important, particularly in the Black community. Even though she's busy running a business and has many hairstylists around, she doesn't really have time to really do her own hair like that, so wigs are a way of her changing up her look, expressing herself, doing something a little different, and keeping it fresh.

Part of how she gets to let out a lot of expression and difference inside of her is through these wigs. She's not afraid to take chances on it. It's also maybe a little advertisement, a little display of what the shop can do and connecting to the community. These wigs are not primarily very expensive wigs. I think if anything costs over \$20, then Lee will pretty much call me and tell me to take it off because he makes sure that we connect to a community that is really shopping in the right price point, but still wants to look good and still wants to express themselves even if they don't have a lot of money. That's something people connect to. This is still a way of her feeling special even in the midst of everything in disarray around her.

Thank you so much for marrying many of the gay community at the Grammy's. It meant so much to people and must have been a great experience for you, too.

You know, it was a great experience, and two of my best friends got married, and I didn't even know they were getting married until they wanted to have my name on their marriage certificate. That situation has the same gravitas that I'm talking about in this situation by having a trans daughter on *Star*. I wish you could see behind the scenes, and all the things that I thought about and went through to actually do that. These are the kind of conversations that are important to have to really allow everyone to move everything forward, and to have real conversations all along the way.

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


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Growing up in an environment with an interesting discourse around the arts and social politics, as well as a mixed race and religious household, presented an interesting perspective

on concepts like nationalism, religious pride, and family. "I believe my interest in inclusivity, feminism and human rights was a slow build", she says.

Her third self-produced album, *Humans*, was recently released, and was conceived during an ancestral journey to her father's homeland in 2015, which provided inspiration for Brilla to write and produce the 10 new songs on the album. The blend of Indian and East African sounds, with an eclectic musical arrangement of drums, bass, guitar, keys, sax, trumpet, congas, and djembe, provides for a truly unique sounding album. Brilla herself plays guitar, keyboards,

percussion, in addition to main vocals. CBC has been playing her tunes on regular rotation, and she's been doing live shows across Canada, and around the world.

The first single off the album, *No More Violence*, has a catchy rhythm and poignant lyrics. "I wrote that song thinking about the over saturation and acceptance of violence in our world, specifically violence against women/femmes and the earth. I don't see it as a coincidence that traditionally more gender-equal cultures also have more of a reverence towards the land. I also see a strong historical connection between the minimization of women's voices to the way our planet and societies have been shaped. Violence comes in many forms, but I do believe that social and environmental balance is the solution to many of our world's problems", she states.

Another song from the album, *Gender Rollz*, also expresses her opinion around the differences that still openly exist between men and women, and those who identify outside that closed dual spectrum. "It's a song about the binary and the dualistic way humans have been conditioned to view the world and its people. We know now that there is so much more that defines gender, sexuality, race, religion, etc".

She cites Amy Winehouse and Bob Marley as her two key influences, and this is certainly apparent with her strong soulful voice mixed with reggae/dub overtones. "There has never been a conscious time in my life that I didn't want to just play music. Music has always been magic to me, and truly the only thing that has brought me through some incredible bouts of depression in my life".

Being one of very few female produced projects who received a Juno nomination, she strongly believes that female musicians have to work harder to get the credit they deserve. "When it comes to gender roles specifically, I am interested in the way gender has played into the music industry. My experiences over the past 15 years in the industry, including being signed to a major label while living in Los Angeles, showed me that typically women are the pretty faces of the

> operation and men are behind the scenes. I would love to see some of that dichotomy change so that folks feel free to navigate life without limitations imposed by their gender", she explains.

Brilla also had the opportunity to put her musical skill to good use with community initiatives."I am so lucky to live in an amazing community where I have access to work on these projects.

Indigenizing Post-Secondary

Education is a short documentary I produced through Conestoga

College. It looks at how Canadian schools are mandated to now

include Indigenous content and pedagogy into our otherwise Euro-centric education models. *Bridges to Belonging* is another awesome initiative that looks to include all sorts of folks across the spectrum in our community. I have played with musicians who use social services like Bridges, so it was only natural that I'd want to produce a song for their video."

Brilla is also a certified yoga teacher, learned while in Rishikesh, India, and her philosophies of well-being can be seen in both her art and activism. She's an arts educator, frequently conducting music and social justice workshops in elementary schools across Canada and internationally. She has also been a mentor for YWCA's *Rock Weekend*, helping marginalized female youth develop social skills through music. Her art aims to unite people through the Canadian cultural kaleidoscope, bringing light to social inequity issues in Canada and abroad. Her music and workshops feature strong themes of cultural diversity, gender equality and inclusivity.

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
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
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
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RUPAUL'S QUEENS WERQ THE WORLD!

About a year ago I came across a news article about Drag Queens in San Francisco involved in a reading program with local libraries. I had been eager for years to bring my performance and my professional passions together. I was inspired and reached out to my dear friend Kaleb Robertson (aka Fluffy Soufflé), and to Michael Erickson, both passionately involved with Glad Day Bookshop. I simply asked, "Can we do this here?" Both were excited by the concept, and Michael began pursuing the Toronto Public Library. By June, we received confirmation that the Yorkville Branch, in conjunction with Pride Toronto, were eager to have this takeoff. I was so excited.



The day of the reading was the Saturday of the final Pride weekend of 2016. I was up early and was painted and ready to go. Kaleb and I headed up to the library, and for the first time in my career I felt nervous. My mind was swirling. What if no one came? What if we were reading to an empty room. We were ushered in and began to dress in a back office. I had chosen a wonderful book by Michael Hall. "Red: A Cravon's Story." There were so many families, so many little ones.

We were seated behind some tall rows of shelves so as to not distract the little ones, as I wanted us to be a surprise. There were four readers altogether, myself, Fluffy and authors Catherine Hernandez and Joyce Grant.

Suddenly I heard some children excitedly say "Mr. Kane!" I turned around as three families from my school came into the library. They all had big grins on their faces, waving at me frantically. This was the first time they had seen me as Fay. They were beaming, and I was overwhelmed with emotion. I felt so supported, so empowered. My nervousness gave way to excitement and happiness. I am introduced to the audience. there's applause and cheers. I feel my heart swelling. I make my way up to the front wearing a Cheeseburger dress, bright fluorescent yellow hair, and long emerald coloured gloves. The children are excitedly talking all at once. There is magic in the air. Smiles abound. How lucky am I? The luckiest.

Kindergarten teacher by day, Lady-bear-extraordinaire by night, Fay Slift has been entertaining audiences in the city since 2007.





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
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DISHPAN HANDS AND HEART - STEVE KEIL

DISHPAN **HANDS AND HEART**

My wide eyed Sunday near evenings Were almost always spent somewhere Lost in the bosom of bar 501 Drinking myself to excessive enjoyment While watching the musical escapades Of Bedeila Bidet Or Virgina Richmond And the crown princess of faux bettes Bunny LeBlanc While they would run through their canon For the window show Named so Because the back wall of the stage Was the front pane of the place.

So writes Steve Keil, reminiscing about Bar 501's legendary Window Show, in his sixth collection of free verse, titled "Dishpan Hands and Heart." Many of the poems in Keil's collections offer distant Church Street memories such as this.

"I started out being a songwriter, wrote over 200 songs, and did some recordings," he explained. "Then I realized I wasn't much of a performer. I wrote screenplays and novels, and then I did an online journal before they were called blogs. Every day I had to find something to write about, so I had to take a trip to the laundromat and make it compelling. Then I thought maybe I should do this as poetry."

One day about eight years ago he read a book about the Beat poets, and decided to try his hand. By the end of that year, he had published his first collection. "I called it "Between Keats and Kerouac", because that is where I sit, both alphabetically and stylistically". he says.



Keil grew up in Oneida, in upstate New York. He attended university in Syracuse and lived in various American cities before ending up in Toronto in the early 90s. For years he performed with rock bands that took their names from The Flintstones (The Rockenshpiels, Go Freddy Go). Later, discovering the work of poets like Frank O'Hara, Billy Collins, and Allan Ginsberg, he stopped all attempts at rhyming to embrace free verse.

A lot of the poems concern the gay village, particularly the glorious period about 15 years ago when there were more performance spaces. "I miss Steve Roseland," he says of his late friend, who hosted singing shows at George's Play and Gladaman's Den, among others. "He led the live singing scene in Toronto's gay village. He was the best party host. I was living in Denver when he died. Coming back, I could really feel his absence." Keil still loves creating music, but feels the music business has changed for the worse. "I'm always listening to top 40, and in every break-up song, it's always someone else's fault. No one accepts any personal responsibility anymore. Those Taylor Swift songs? 'You did this to me.' Whereas in my writing, it's always my fault, I'm not afraid to be responsible, or embarrassed."


So can a poet ever get rich? "There is no future in poetry. There is no audience, no money, but I love the doing of it. Singing and writing poetry are the only things that keep me from losing my mind."

Best known for her ten-year run as a DJ on Fire Island, Lina currently still DJ's around New York City.

Boyd Kodak - What have you been doing over the last vear?

Lina Bradford - I have dedicated all of my self to "In The Dollhouse", now in season two. Experiencing season one helped me grow and understand this part of my life, and continuing to push myself is always the most exciting thing.

BK - During that time, which was the one most exciting event for you?

LB - One particular moment that really shines very bright was last June, when I was fortunate enough to work with youth at the American Embassy in Vietnam. I feel very blessed and privileged to have been asked to take part.

BK -What are you looking forward to over the next year?

LB - I'm excited to see how my show touches and moves people. It's exciting how organic all of the wonderful things that I do come out to play and touch people. I get very caught up in doing, and sometimes forget the magnitude of all the things that I do. I sit back, and I'm like, wow you've done a lot of wonderful things. As an Aries woman I always got to keep on moving, making myself and other people happy.

BK - Where can we see your work?

LB - Well aside from my speaking engagements with youth and the transgender community, being a global ambassador for Hetrick Martin Institute, a grass-roots advocacy organization that provides social support and programming for LGBTQ youth, a board member with Gay Men's Health Crisis, and my Throwback Sundays DJ party at The Gilded Lily, you get to watch brand-new episodes of "In The Dollhouse" every Thursday.

BK- Any message you would like to put out there?

LB - Remember to connect with people. We are a physical interactive species, and more human visual contact goes a long way, as does a smile. Take some time away from these (electronic) devices, and talk to people.

BK - Finish this sentence. If I could have three wishes, they would be

LB - 1. To find a cure to all of the diseases. 2. Have people all over the world connecting as brothers and sisters. 3. Better health care for all.

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

BEYOND THE VILLAGE

GET WET AT OASIS ACHALOUNGE



Oasis Aqualounge once known as the Club Baths and one of the locations busted during the 1983 bathhouse raids, is a nineteenth century mansion come adult playground. Billed as a venue for couples and women who want to explore their sexuality or enhance their relationship, the space boasts a thoughtful array of programming for women and the people who love them.

I spoke with Fatima Mechtab (aka Miss F), Marketing Director and Event Producer, to find out more about their space and special events.

What do you think is the biggest misconception that sex clubs have?

I think that people think that they have to have sex, or they put pressure/expectations on themselves to engage in play, when in reality everything is optional. You don't need to play with other partners, and you don't even have to have sex! We provide a sexually charged, clothing optional environment with liberal values, but what one does when there is completely up to them.

You could just run a sex club and make money, so why is it important to you to also be a healthy sex advocate?

Healthy sexuality (including kink and fetishes that bring pleasure), body acceptance, and/or intimacy is something that most humans want in their lives. Everyone should have access or at least information and opportunities to express that side of them, without the fear of being judged or being harmed. Oasis is a special world offering an escape from societal norms, and most of all it's a community of people who share that same common vision.

What can someone expect from your Sapphic Aquatica event?

Sapphic Aquatica is an exclusive event for women and trans folk, that also includes those who identity as non-binary. Sapphic once started as an event only for women and



woman-identified, but as I grew to understand the trans community it became more inclusive both in language and those permitted to attend. A typical event is held bi-monthly on the last Sunday, and we also hold a special Pride event every June. Each party features a DJ, some type of workshop/ demonstration, and "Sybian" rides, which is operated by a trained staff member. I show queer-specific porn on the monitors, and all of the fabulous facilities are available to guests. For larger events, such as Pride and our anniversary parties, we often add a fundraising element to support important and valuable LGBTQ+ charitable organizations, like Rainbow Railroad and Trans LifeLine.

Why is there a "no cis men" policy at this particular event?

The reason that no cis men are permitted is because I feel it's important to take/give space specifically for women and all trans identities. Cis men are welcome at Oasis on any other day, so I think that for one night, those who attend Sapphic can have the entire place to themselves, to feel free, sexy and safe without having to face typical judgment or expectations that are often encountered in everyday life.


