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


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The Editor

While Beyonce, Britney, and Beiber lose their aging fan base as quickly as you can say, Backstreet Boys and Spice Girls, there's a multitude of acts who had their heyday back in the 1980s, or earlier, who are still putting out critically-acclaimed new music and touring to sold out audiences several decades later.

One just has to take a look at the concert listings in the city to see that retro is all the rage. Robert Plant (Feb 17 – Massey Hall), Bananarama (Feb 23 – Danforth), **Book of Love** (Mar 9 – Lees), Clan of Xymox (Mar 20 - Lee's), Rod Stewart (Mar 22 – ACC), **Ministry** (April 14 - Opera House), The Breeders (May 6 -Phoenix), Bon Jovi (Mav 12 – ACC), **Def Leppard/Journey** (Jun 1 Rogers), Hall and Oates (June 5 - ACC) Jethro Tull (July 3 – Budweiser), **Weezer** and **Pixies** (July 14 – Budweiser), **Eagles** (July 15 - ACC), **Erasure** (July 24 – Queen Elizabeth Theatre), **David Byrne** (Aug 3 – Sony Centre), Rod Stewart/Cyndi Lauper (Aug 10 – Budweiser), **Lynyrd Skynyrd** (Aug 11 – Budweiser), Jeff Lynne's **ELO** (Aug 18 – ACC), and the king of gueens, **Elton John** (Sep 25/26 – ACC) on his Farewell Yellow Brick Road tour.

So what is it that keeps these musicians doing what they love, and fans showing up to support them, often with sold out performances? There's obviously that nostalgic factor for those who are old enough to have been there for the first wave and want to relive some of their youth. Then there's also a whole new younger demographic that have been hearing the music on the radio, in clubs, or grew up listening to it through their parents or older siblings. In fact, there's often parent-child outings to these retro revivals, and the age demographic is quite wide ranging.

We decided to feature **Bananarama** on our cover this issue, as these ladies recently regrouped as the original threesome, and are including Toronto in one of their very limited four-date North American tour schedule. Despite still holding the record for the most singles to chart by a girl group ever. this marks the first-ever tour with the original lineup. Siobhan Fahey called in guits back in 1988, right after a performance on the Brit Awards, citing creative differences, which is often the case with band break ups. She went on to form the darker, goth-like **Shakespears Sister**, while band mates Sara Dallin and Keren Woodward continued to release music and tour under the same moniker with a replacement singer. Neither of these projects reached the height of success as the original line up, so here we are today, three decades later, and fans are ecstatic.

Despite having several chart-topping singles, the band began like many others from England during the 1980s, as disenfranchised street punks with no musical talents. That all changed as the band



formed and became a viable entity. Dallin says"We wrote our own material, or co-wrote it. I don't think people always bothered to recognize that. We weren't manufactured." Believe it or not, it will be the first time the ladies will be performing some of their hits together live on stage, outside of the studio recordings and press appearances. So expect to hear all the classics, like *Shy Boy, Cruel Summer,* and of course, *Venus*. As for the chance of any new music, Dallin hinted that they were looking at doing a new single, and "experiment creatively" in the studio. Either way, fans are in for a rare treat when they take the stage at The Danforth Music Hall on February 23.

Another blast from the past who's in Toronto this month is none other than **Boy George**, but not for a concert performance. The Boy is appearing as one of the mentors on CTV's original music series, where contestants perform songs provided to them in hopes of being chosen to advance to the recording stage, and become the next big thing.

George described his role as having to find the right voice for the song, which doesn't necessarily mean a better singer, but whether they are right for that piece. He says, "Certain people just capture a moment, but we see less and less of that now. Whenever I see anybody who's really an individual, I try to encourage them to celebrate who they are, and remind them that's the thing about them that's going to really make people remember them." He also gave the following advice to the contestants, "Celebrate who you are, focus on what's good about you, and not the negative stuff." Boy George's episode of **The**

Launch airs February 14, along with fellow mentor, Canadian superstar Alessia Cara. The final episode of the series airs the following week.

Of course, Boy George is most widely known as the flamboyant lead singer of 1980s pop group, **Culture Club**, who sold more than 100 million singles and 50 million albums worldwide. The band became the first group since The Beatles to have three Top 10 hits in America from a debut album, and the first group in music history to have an album certified diamond in Canada. George has performed in Toronto several times, both as a solo musician, a DJ, and with Culture Club back at the height of their career. Word has it that there's a new album and tour dates on the horizon for the original CC line up, and perhaps even a Las Vegas showpiece.

There's a very good chance this will come to fruition, as apparently some material has already been recorded. After falling into the wild rock star lifestyle during his younger days, George has been on the clean and sober path for many years now. He recently told *Gay Times*,"I eat well, I exercise, I don't drink, and I don't take drugs. Having self-control is such a revelation, being in charge and just getting shit done!" He's also entered into a new recording agreement with BMG, his first label signing in nearly 30 years, and will be releasing a solo covers album later this year. His most recent album, *This Is What I Do*, was well-received by critics as well.

A DJ since the late 70's, Boy George has had a long and successful career associated with house





music stemming from early acid house and Chicago grooves in the 80's, through to electro and tech house in the 90's and 00's. Away from his musical successes George has been a columnist for national newspaper the Daily Express, the author of two bestselling autobiographies, and has been the coproducer, songwriter and on-stage star of the awardwinning musical *Taboo* on both New York's Broadway and London's West End. Alongside all of this he runs his own fashion label, *B-Rude*, with outlets in New York, Los Angeles, and London. Not bad for yet another disenfranchised punk from the UK.

Two other 80s acts making stops in Toronto this year are, **Orchestral Manoeuvres In The Dark** (OMD), who play The Danforth Music Hall on March 12. The Punishment of Luxury is the bands thirteenth studio album, released late last year, debuting at number four on the UK Albums Chart with close to 10,000 copies sold in its first week. OMD frontman Andy McCluskey describes the album as,"a metaphor for modern life, first world problems." Sexy senior **Rod Stewart** is also on tour and makes not one, but two appearances in Toronto this year. First on March 22nd at the ACC, then he returns with gay 80s icon **Cyndi Lauper** on the bill at the outdoor Budweiser Stage on August 10.

Finally, gay heartthrobs **Erasure** are making their way back to Toronto, July 24 at the intimate Queen Elizabeth Theatre. Members Andy Bell and Vince Clarke are touring on the heels of their latest album release, *World Be Gone*, and have announced a collaboration with *Echo Collective*, a Brussels-based group of post-classical musicians. This unique collaboration sees the entirety of the album given a rework entitled, *World Beyond*. Andy Bell stated, "The reinterpretations have brought such enormous

context to the songs, and created a new place for them. This can be heard on *Still It's Not Over*, which tackles the LGBT rights movement post-Stonewall, and *Lousy Some Of Nothing*, a ballad for our post-truth age.

So while the 80s continue to live on, last year also saw a 90s resurgence with the likes Front 242, My Life With The Thrill Kill Kult, Revolting Cocks, and Lords of Acid all making stops in our fair city. So will this continue, and we'll start seeing '00 bands on the horizon? With today's ADD instant-gratification, what's-next generation, there's a great possibility that the legendary musician status has become a thing of the past. Don't tell that to the Rolling Stones or The Who though!

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
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
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Sky Gilbert is a writer, professor, playwright, and art provocateur. His legacy as founder and artistic director of Buddies In **Bad Times Theatre has earned** him the title, 'Grandmother of Queer Theatre'. His art predominantly explores what makes queer people unique - our sexuality. In mainstream media, gays are often synonymous with interior decorating, cozy sweaters and episodes of Will & Grace, but these are cultural stereotypes that have nothing to do with being gay. Sexuality and its impact (or lack thereof) on culture, art and politics is the intersection where Sky plays, inserting a dissenting voice into the narrative thereby presenting us with new realities to consider.


Sky's latest work, about American ayant-garde leaders John Cage and Merce Cunningham, explores the little discussed relationship between the two men and its impact on their work. John Cage is best known for the composition 4'33" which is performed without sound from the musician, thus becoming a study of the environmental sounds observed by the audience. Merce Cunningham was the most significant choreographer of our time, but what is lesser known about these two is that they were lovers of thirty-five years. It's this fact that frames Gilbert's new work, "I Cook, He Does The Dishes". I spoke with Sky about this and his latest projects, and what we can look forward to in the coming

Why did you write "I Cook, He Does The Dishes"?

I wrote it because I was very angry when I found out that John Cage and Merce Cunningham were lovers for 35 years. John Cage was the inventor of modern music while Merce was the inventor of modern dance. and they really radicalized the whole avant-garde theatre and music scene in the United States during the 40's, 50's and 60's. Yet nobody talks about the fact that they were partners. It was in the 30's that Cage was struggling, going to psychiatrists, and married to a woman, before the threesome with Merce and his wife. This is what my play is about, but it takes a very radical form in the Theatre Centre's Incubators Space. which basically looks like a garage. The performance

goes back and forth between scenes from his life, while at the same time recreating the world of John Cage's avant-garde work.

After seeing this play what do you hope people will walk away with?

I want people to think about their relationship between art and sexuality. I think quite often there is some relationship, but we don't talk about it as much, It's one of the things my work is about and it goes back to that core idea. The title of the play comes from a funny quote from John Cage when they ask him about his relationship with Merce, and his explanation was, "I cook, he does the dishes."

You're working with Dustin Peters on "Chéri The Musical", starring Teresas Tova at the Toronto Fringe Festival. What's this show about?

It's an hour-long musical based on the novel Chéri by Colette (France, 1920), which I created it with Dustin Peters, a wonderful composer who has worked with people like John Greyson. The play is mostly from the point of view of Léa who is in love with a younger man, and it explores what happens when you get older and give up your charm and trying to look pretty.

You're also working with Dustin on an opera, "Shakespeare's Criminal", for Buddies' 2018/2019 season. Can you divulge anything at the moment?

We're showcasing this in stages. The first will be part of Buddies' 40th anniversary season in the Chamber, It's a bizarre tale of Shakespeare meeting a young man who has HIV.

As a queer playwright, what do you know now that you wish someone had told you when you started?

That being gay would go out of style. I wished someone had warned me that at a certain point people would say, "oh that's so old, so boring, so mainstream. It's not even a thing anymore."


Joie's home was filled with music and salsa dancing, her mom was funny and her father creative.

"He did some very unique arrangements with tropical flowers and cut mirror in vases for a time, and was once commissioned by Jackie Onassis. It was not a sustainable living so he never gave up being a paralegal.'

Joie also maintains a second successful career, having earned her Bachelors of Science in Electrical Engineering, where she minored in Computer Science, from Rutgers University. "A few years ago I came very close to completing my Masters in System Design and Management at MIT, but chose to take my thesis commercial and patent my work"

It's these skills that make her the perfect lead for a trip to help the beleaguered people of Puerto Rico in the upcoming weeks. "Imagine yourself standing in the dark, naked, and your entire life is gone - work, school, travel, routine, furniture, your home, maybe even loved ones. That is how many are existing in Puerto Rico today. Anything we can do will be an improvement."

Joie's compassion for life has resulted in her creating a beautiful new coffee table book featuring 49 artists to each represent a life lost during the mass shooting at Pulse Nightclub in Orlando, Florida. "I am Latina, lesbian, I lived in the area, and I recognized one of the victims. I knew the only way to fight hate was with love, and the vision for 49 (Cuarenta y Nueve) became a calling. Still, I could not do it by myself. It was too painful. My friends and family came together to help. All 49 of the contributors are angels sent to help me honour more angels."



The future is bright for Joie who has also co-written a screenplay based on her memoirs with award-winning filmmaker Kate Johnston (Tru Love). "Las Alas (The Wings), is based on my memoirs. Kate did the heavy lifting and I infused it with all of the Latin, Puerto Rican spice that it needs. We have some major, well-known actors and actresses slated for the film which should begin shooting in the fall of 2018. It has already been compared to Moonlight, as far as recognition of the script, and will be the first Puerto Rican lesbian movie to hit the big screen. I'm super excited about this. It does not get any better than that!"





Boyd Kodak - What have you been doing over the last year?

Max Denley - I've been working as the Director of Facilitation for the youth-focused non-profit organization. The Get REAL Movement. We offer inclusivity workshops and leadership development through our chapter programs across North America. Our programming aims to break down prejudice. promote unity, and foster compassion in our world. I hope that my openness and vulnerability lets kids see that trans people are not that different than they are, and also allows trans students to see a relatable role model that I was missing in school.

BK - During that time, which was the one most exciting event for you?

MD - Speaking at my old high school was a pretty exciting moment for me both professionally and personally. The visit inspired a lot of self-reflection on my own journey, who I was in high school and how far I have come since. We also launched our new after-school program for LGBTQ+ and ally youth in the Toronto area this past fall, and that has been a very exciting process to be a part of.

BK - What are you looking forward to over the next year?

MD - Continuing to reach more students across the country through the workshop program, and building/expanding the after-school program further. Some of the best parts of doing what we do is getting to see Canada and meet people from all over. So many unique people with meaningful stories to share.

BK - Where can we see your work?

BK - Future plans?

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OUT ON THE DANFORTH



Size Matters, Smaller IS Better

Gone are the days of the massive, over-priced mega parties, concert venues and over-the-top theatrical events. While the larger-than-life night out still has it's place, it seems to have reached its peak long ago. Today, smaller venues are attracting big crowds who are looking for a few hours of entertainment without breaking the bank.

Don't get me wrong, I love large venues like the Air Canada Centre (ACC), but the price tag coupled with the effort to get there makes it less appealing as a regular entertainment option. The **Danforth Music Hall** may be small in comparison, but as an event venue they host big name diva's, drag queens and bands for a fraction of a big ticket concert. Catch the hottest girls from RuPaul's Drag Race like the upcoming *Bianca Del Rio* (Mar 20), and musical acts like *Bananarama* (Feb 23), *OMD* (Mar 12) and *Why Don't We* (Apr 14). The recently opened **Danforth Sidebar** is adjacent to the Music Hall, and owned by the same team, making it the perfect spot to begin or continue your entertaining evening.

Just across the street is **The Social Capital** which is tucked away on the third floor above **The Black Swan**, where you can enjoy comedy, improve and all things funny. If you love it enough, they also offer comedy classes so you can hold your own show. A little farther east is **Coal Mine Theatre**, Toronto's answer to the Off-Off-Broadway experience. With only eighty seats they continually curate a compelling selection of new works. Founded by Ted Dykstra (founding member of Soulpepper Theatre, and co-creator of "2 Pianos, 4 Hands"), and Diana Bentley (12 Monkeys, and Soulpepper's, Our Town).

Farther east still is **Relish Bar & Grill** which is a live musicians venue. Hosting a cabaret style stage, the Relish experience can be as intimate as it is energetic. Twenty-one beers on tap and a menu created by a New York trained chef. Owner Joanne Clayton has been running the place for over thirteen years and is a veteran in the food and entertainment industry. Like many smaller venues, her decision to offer live music (currently eleven shows per week) was in an effort to offset revenues from just operating a restaurant. Likewise, her choice to hire musicians has created a symbiotic relationship whereby both benefit. As Joanne explains "I think it's very hard to make a living as just a restaurant.
