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

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

A LOT TO CELEBRATE! BY KENDALL PARTINGTON

Homosexuality was only decriminalized in 1969. The last person to be charged, convicted and imprisoned, under said law, was George Klippert in 1965. A mechanic from the Northwest Territories, he admitted to four separate cases of consensual sex with men and was found guilty of "gross indecency." The court-ordered psychiatrist deemed him "incurably homosexual." It wasn't until Pierre Trudeau presented the Criminal Law Amendment Act, that gay sex was decriminalized among consenting adults. Kippler remained in prison until 1971 but he lived 25 more years until his death from kidney disease.

So that's arguably the most eventful turning point in Canada's LGBTQ history, and naturally Ontario's by default. We couldn't have had a Pride event of any kind when simply admitting to having gay sex would have landed you in jail.





So this brings us to the 70's and it's post-Stonewall. They had their riots in New York the same year as our decriminalization. So did Toronto have an official Pride parade in the seventies? The answer is no, and the reason why is a very good question.

Essentially the reason Toronto did not have an official Pride celebration was that neither the media, nor the general public were outright supportive of the initiative of the Gay and Lesbian movement at that time, as it was known, LGBTQ, transgendered, twospirited and many other common buzzwords by today's standards were not in voque at the time.

It was also a formative period between males and females as their differing views on how to approach change in society was varied and many times polarizing.

In the early 1970's "Gav Dav Picnics" were held at Hanlon's Point. The picnics included a festival, film night, dancing and a rally at Queen's Park to present a brief to the Ontario government. Permission to officially march on Yonge Street was denied.

The seventies finished with memories of constant raids and shakedowns of local establishments by police who were it's fair to say, overstepping their own lawful bounds and institutionalizing many forms of homophobia through their actions.

In relation to this article, the BUZZ conducted a fascinating video interview with a long-term Toronto resident, Ron Forster, who answers many such questions from his personal recollections. Being a part of Toronto's first Pride, Forester recalls, the struggle to launch the city's first official Pride.

Forster says, "Every June Gay people used to go to Toronto Island. There were speeches, but nothing radical to what was to become in the future. There was harassment from the police, there was no doubt about that and they have been doing that for years. They wouldn't allow us to do anything in the main part of the city so we had to go to the island. It was like Woodstock."

Forster recalls the first official Pride in Toronto. "The first official Pride was supposed to be in 1981. Because of the steambath raids in February it was cancelled for that year so 1982 was actually the first (official) Pride. Back then there was zero support from the straight community. Gays were labeled as criminals. Never in my imagination did I ever think back in 1982 that there would be a WorldPride in Toronto, because all we wanted was equality back

Toronto was planning a Pride parade to be held in 1981, but instead something happened that completely blew the lid off the simmering anger and resentment that was keeping the community from losing their cool and taking a stand. The police conducted a large-scale destructive and deliberately embarrassing raid on February 5th, 1981 at a local bathhouse called the Richmond. Operation Soap resulted in over 300 men being arrested and held the distinction of being the largest mass arrest in Canada since the 1970 October Crisis.

This precipitated many suicides and firings of people when it hit the media, and a 4000 strong angry mob descended on 52 division chanting "Fuck you 52" on Feb 20th. This led to calls for a general inquiry into the police and there were demands of charges and firings but not a single policeman was ultimately punished.

A major demonstration was held at Yonge and Wellesley the next day by hundreds of Toronto queers, closing down the street. Activists start working, and the group Gays and Lesbians Against the Right is formed. Lesbian and Gay Pride Day Toronto is legally incorporated. 1,500 celebrate on Sunday, June 28 at Grange Park. In spite of the politically charged atmosphere that year, the day is billed as a time to relax, celebrate, and as "an afternoon of fun and frolic," Toronto's version of Stonewall, in 1981, led to subsequent yearly marches and festivities held every June.

1990's

Pride parades were happening to some extent every year after the 1981 protest and heading into the 1990's we had acceptance of gay employees and benefits being offered by progressive corporations. Sponsorships grew from major banks and companies, and LGBTQ community organizations were firmly in place.

In 1991, Toronto followed Ottawa's lead and formed the LGBT Police Liaison Committee, with members of both the city's LGBT community and the Ottawa Police force, sitting on it, as well as Canada's first police unit specifically dedicated to the investigation and prosecution of hate crimes.

In 1999, George Smitherman become the first openly Gay man to be elected to represent the provincial riding of Toronto Centre. The nineties also saw the first Dyke March. The March is now a yearly engagement, a beacon to Lesbians everywhere, and an affirmation that Lesbians are a valued and welcomed part of the LGBTQ community. The Dyke March has now become a tradition in most major cities across North America.



In the turn of the century, Gay marriage becomes legal nationwide. The Court of Appeal for Ontario rules in 2003, in Halpern v. Canada, that the common law definition of marriage as being between one man and one woman violates section 15 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. The decision immediately legalizes same-sex marriage in Ontario, and sets a legal precedent – over the next two years, similar court decisions legalize same-sex marriage in seven provinces and one territory before the federal Civil Marriage Act is passed in 2005.

Also that year, on the 25th anniversary of Toronto's Pride Week, Bill Blair becomes the first chief of police in the city's history to participate in the Pride parade.

Pride theme's change from rights for LGBTQ here and now to "We March for Those Who Can't" and Toronto is internationally recognized as one of the beacons of progressive LGBTQ rights. So we had a great deal of progress in an incredibly short time as civil rights fights go. The first Trans March took place in 2009. The Trans

community in Toronto had seen resistance to the idea of a Trans march for years, and in 2009 a group of activists decided to create a march for themselves. Toronto Pride attempted to confine the newly formed Trans March to the sidewalks of Church Street up to Wellesley Street. Instead, participants took to the streets and marched past the barriers on Wellesley Street. After several years of contention, the Trans March is now an official event of Toronto Pride.



Which brings us to the year 2014. Toronto has a solid 33 years of Pride festivals and the city is awarded the honour to host WorldPride. Toronto will be only the fourth city to hold the honour respectively after Rome, Jerusalem and London, England. The International event is held every 5 years to commemorate the anniversary of Stonewall.

Toronto has a lot to celebrate this year. We have Melissa Etheridge as one of our main headliners, so that's awesome entertainment factor primo right there! We have the very easy-on-the-eyes Chicagoan Steve Grand coming to town who went viral with his "All-American Boy" video that he released last year to international success that landed him on Good Morning America and Ellen. Deborah Cox, Martha Wash, Carly Rae Jepsen, and DJ's David Morales and Quentin Harris are also some of the artists performing at the largest global LGBTQ celebration.


So from a city that went from little pride in 1969 to WorldPride in 45 years, our community has a right to pat itself on the back and say job well done. Lets make this one a real party!



FEATURE BY BRANDON MICHAEL LEE



Before Britney and Rihanna had an S&M tryst, before Katy Perry kissed a girl and before Miley showed the world her tongue, there was Carole Pope.

Well before the pop stars of today, Carole was an artist who broke through the walls of conformity with outspoken lyrics of high school lesbianism and donned bondage attire on stage.

As the voice of the Canadian New Wave rock band "Rough Trade", Carole went where very few people were willing to go. Their 1981 hit "High School Confidential" was the first explicitly lesbian-themed Top 40 hit in the world! After multiple Juno awards, and a Genie award, Carole took to Los Angeles to pursue more film and television soundtrack work. She's appeared on multiple soundtracks, appeared in the Toronto production of "The Vagina Monologues" and is an Ambassador for the Harvey Milk High

School as well as being on the Board of Directors for the Songwriters Association of Canada.

We caught up with Carole to discuss her last solo album "Landfall", her upcoming work, and how much the music industry has changed. And through it all and over the years, Carole is still a voice that will echo through with a real message.

Brandon Michael Lee: What was the inspiration, or overall message of your latest album, Landfall?

Carole: There's a terrible wonderful scary upheaval going on with nature and patriarchal society, and governments who are really corporations, stripping away our rights. We're in a state of flux, which may or may not turn out well. I think most people feel this seismic shift regardless of how unconscious they might seem so in essence we're all searching for a Landfall or inner peace.

Brandon: As an artist who has always stood out, broke down walls and boundaries, do you find it harder to maintain a relevant voice with these issues in a world where these subjects are now used as marketing ploys?

Carole: I think people know when you're being honest. I have nothing to prove which is extremely freeing so I say what I want. Most indie bands are so insipid and formulaic. I can't think of any who are really political.

Brandon: How would you say Carole Pope today, has evolved personally and artistically, from Carole Pope of Rough Trade?

Carole: As I said earlier I have nothing to prove so I do what makes me happy and my audience gets it. So it's not that much different from Rough Trade in that respect.

Brandon: How do you feel about people like Madonna, or Cher, who are transforming themselves to stay in competition with younger artists? As an artist, do you think this kind of diminishes the persona and voice they once had?

Carole: I think in the case of Madonna she should stop trying to be all hipster and ghetto or whatever the hell it is she's going for. She should try to grow as a fifty something rad outspoken woman. As for Cher, She can do no wrong. She is what she is and her music is timeless. I've seen her in Vegas even though I'm not a fan of dance music she really puts on a great show and doesn't give a fuck, which I can totally relate to.

Brandon: As a Board Member of the Harvey Milk High School, do you see a change in the acceptance of young gay students in terms of their safety and mass acceptance, as opposed to how it was years ago?

Carole: I think straight kids today are more open and accepting and have experimented more sexually, so it's more of a non-issue.

Brandon: If the fate of the Human World depended on you having to perform a duet with one female pop star of today, who would you choose?

Carole: Oh God. If it has to be a pop star I'd pick Beyonce, but if I could choose an anti-pop star it would be PJ Harvey.

Brandon: How do you feel about shows like American Idol, and the Voice, and their impact on the music industry?

Carole: Those shows are so unrealistic I never watch them. Get out there and play in a band! That's the only

I have fond memories of the first Dyke March. I was a producer on QTV for ROGERS Television covering queer events including Pride, in 1996. That particular year was stellar for the Toronto Lesbian community as it was the year The Dyke March came into existence.



This was to be a separate event held the day before the Pride Parade whereby Women and Trans people were encouraged to come out and show their political strengths. "Great" I thought, after all, this had been touted as more inclusionary for the marginalized and hot women everywhere? I was definitely in!

What I wasn't expecting was so much debate over this decision. Groups of women were passionately discussing the issues of division and separateness. The pitch table at QTV was a hotbed of ideas and confusion. It didn't seem anyone was blasé about the matter either and the most common discussion ... why is this necessary?

Had we not won the right as queers to strut our stuff during the Pride parade? Is Gay not Gay if you are a woman? Does this mean Lesbians only join the march on Saturday and no longer walk on Sunday? Where do Trans, Bisexual and other Queer identified peeps participate now? "This will never take off "expressed one director. Boy was he wrong!

The afternoon was beautiful, weather and spirit wise. A first time all Women and Trans crew! To my ears here was a wondrous joy and laughter cadence that soundtracked the day. It is hard to believe the trepidation shown prior.

Yes I had been to Pride many times, including watching as a teen from the sidelines on the sidewalk the early 80's. Wow, a group of gays, men, women, drag queens, I admit I knew nothing, but my stomach did a flippityflip turn of happy. Despite my girlfriend not coming with me (we were not out), I had felt proud when I finally used that gut and heart pounding, walked a couple blocks.

Forward to '96 where 5000 beaming smiles shone from women's faces showed solidarity I had never seen before. It was life changing to see that many women filled with such purpose and enthusiasm, a euphoric experience.

Watching my mother's generation on television, burning their bras while demanding equal rights, was the only place I remembered observing such unity between women. I recalled the different points of view dividing friendships and families I overheard then too, but now with a new clarity.



In speaking with different women recently, I was struck by just how many told me they haven't attended lately due to other summer holiday plans. In some ways we take women's spaces for granted. This year it is different! WorldPride Baby!

The largest one ever, meaning a huge influx of women from around the planet, coming here to celebrate with all of us Canadian gals. Personally I am looking forward to soaking it all in. The stage is set. This year's Dyke March will be the ultimate women's community event Toronto has ever seen and the world will be watching.

SERBEE PRIDE

Its Pride time and honey, I've been there from the very beginning. I remember a time when the only gay was Marvin Gaye, back when if you took drugs and had sex all night it was just called Friday, not Pride Day.

I was at Stonewall that hot summer night in 1969. Judy Garland had just died and we wanted to celebrate her life by getting really wrecked, like she would have, but the cops showed up and ruined it. So we thought, what would Judy do? She would probably get all angry and throw shit at them, like pennies and and shoes and barbiturates. Wait, not the barbiturates. What a riot, I mean, literally. Our emotions were right on the surface, where they belong.

There weren't many Pride marches in the seventies, because everybody was just too damn busy boogying. But then, one night in 1981, I was at a bathhouse right here in Toronto, having a bath, and once again the cops burst in and ruined the fun. There was no riot that night, though. I mean, we were all in towels. Although, we did have a little bit of fun in the back of the paddy wagon.

Afterwards, my righteous indignation roiled to the surface, so I rounded up a bunch of my friends and said, "Let's have a picnic!" So we did, and we bragged about it all year long until the following summer, every gay person in the city wanted to come to our little gettogether and it grew and grew.

I loved those early Pride days. I remember one of the very first, in the parkette behind the 519, consisting of all the same guys who went to Chaps. The only thing that was different was that this was broad daylight,

sheesh! It was hot but there was a wading pool just sitting there, but for some reason lesbians with headsets kept yelling at us not to use it. So right from the beginning, everyone had found their niche.



Over the years I've done it all. Flounced around in a bridal gown with a big sign around my neck that said "gay bride," rode with the Dykes on Bikes, handed out condoms while wearing a fright wig, did tuff-drag on rollerblades, marched with both QUIA and the Jews - I don't take sides, sister, I even marched with the totally naked men.

have been living in the country for 11 years, I admit to only ever seeing Lucas Silveira and The Cliks once in recent years...but, once is all it took to become a big fan of both the solo artist, and the band. Very excited to see both on the stages of WorldPride 2014.

Lucas Silveira is best known as the front man, songwriter and founding member of the rock band The Cliks. Lucas has become a leading force in the LGBTQ community for the promotion and visibility of transgender people in the mainstream music industry. He is the first out transgender male to be signed to a major record label deal and has toured with music icons including Cyndi Lauper, The Cult, Debbie Harry and The New York Dolls.

Boyd: Tell us what you have been doing over the least year?

Lucas: Promoting the last Cliks release 'Black Tie Elevator'. We went on two tours and after the last I took some time off to prepare for festival season.

Boyd: Where did you tour and who with?

Lucas: Toured all over the US. From the North East Coast to the West Coast and all the way around and back. We toured with a local band called Hot Peach.

Boyd: During the last year, what was the one most exciting event for you?

Lucas: The time off I took to get a hysterectomy! Doesn't sound like fun but it was the first time I had time off with no quilt involved.

Boyd: No guilt time is good.

Boyd: What are you looking forward to over for the next year?

Lucas: Change. I'd like to try new things this year. Boyd: In any specific area of your life?

Lucas: Yes. Mainly in how I connect to my music and art overall. I just want to try new things and not have to think about the industry side of things. Experiment with new styles of music. Maybe start a new band. Who knows? Write a book even.

Boyd: Where can we see you at Pride?

Lucas: The Cliks are performing on the main stage Friday, June 27th and I will be playing a solo acoustic set on Sunday June 19th but still don't know which stage.

Boyd: Just for fun tell us your favorite TV show of all time?

Lucas: Seinfeld.

Boyd: Any message you would like to put out for WorldPride 2014?

Lucas: Remember that we are not all free. This Pride is extremely important to show the rest of the world that we must have solidarity with our brothers and sisters in countries where they are undergoing horrific human rights violations. We must be vocal about it.

10X10 is a yearly portrait exhibition of queer Canadians in the arts. The reception for this year's show is June 26 at 7pm at the Gladstone Hotel (1214 Queen St. W.). I caught up with Toronto-based artist and exhibition curator James Fowler by email.

Owen: What is 10X10? How did you come up with the idea?

James: Each year I ask ten gueer Canadian photographers to each take ten portraits. The resulting 100 portraits are exhibited at the Gladstone Hotel. I started the project in 2011. After asking photographers David Pike, Joey Bruni and Paul Buen if they might want to shoot some portraits, I realized I knew a lot more queer photographers so I put the first group together in a tiny space in Kensington Market.

Owen: What support and feedback have you received from the gueer and non-gueer community?

James: The turnout in the first year was overwhelming. There were more people on the street than could fit into the space. I knew I had hit a nerve and knew there was an appetite for visual art programming during Toronto's Pride celebrations. Since then it has been a learning experience balancing community and criticality. I get great feedback about ways to better mine the gueer and arts communities to ensure a diverse representation of photographers and subjects.

Owen: Who do you hope will visit the exhibition?

James: 10X10 is really for anyone who wants to see interesting and diverse approaches to portraiture by some of Canada's most notable photographers. The opening night is anything but quiet, though. Not only is it a night for celebration, it's a night when you get to see the people who are making arts and culture events happen in Toronto and across Canada. We get to see familiar faces, people we haven't seen in a while and a chance to make new friends.

Owen: Does this year's exhibition have a specific theme?

James: There's never been an over arching theme, but some photographers' portrait sets have been thematic. Each photographer comes from a different professional background so it's always interesting to see how each chooses to approach the project.

Owen: What are your hopes for the future of 10X10?

James: What started as a single year project has grown significantly. I'm committed to it for ten vears. By 2021 I will have produced ten books and exhibitions, worked with 100 queer Canadian photographers and collectively documented 1000 LGBTI Canadians in the arts. It's ambitious and the project is bigger than one person can manage, so I'm assembling a working board to help make an event like this grow. Vancouver has a successful Queer Arts Festival, which I think Toronto should have. J. hope 10X10 .can .be .part .of .a bigger .gueer. arts festival in the future.

You can find the 10X10 exhibition at the Gladstone Hotel (1214 Queen St. W.) from June 5 to August 18.

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
