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With each edition of the BUZZ we hope to celebrate the diversity of our community. This edition we choose to focus on leather and drag for our main features. Both communities have a long history within queer culture.

The leather community can be traced back to the 1940's, which grew out of the "biker" culture. Leather clubs, for gay men, started in the 1950's in Europe. I remember when I was a kid; some of the first imagery of being gay I saw, in media, was gay men with big mustaches in leather. Today the community is much more inclusive of practitioners including: gay, lesbian, straight. trans, bisexual and drag artists.. On our cover we tried to feature some of this diversity and celebrate those who gave visibility to our community for over 70 years!

Drag queens and kings are the celebrities of our community and Toronto is lucky to have so many talented ones. Drag goes back to ancient Roman literature and classical Chinese theatre. Since women were generally banned from performing on stage, men had to perform all of the parts. The drag queens, of which we speak today, first started in the 1950s and 60s. Even though the drag scene started around that time, it didn't properly flourish until the liberation of the LGBTQ community in North America. As we all know, the gueens "kicked ass" the night of the Stonewall raids, in 1969, and started a revolution so that today we're able to invite the world to Toronto to celebrate how fabulous our community is!

Thanks to these communities for making life more colourful and interesting and for standing out and making the world take notice!

Brandon Michael Lee is an Award Winning Wedding & Event Designer, Writer and Blogger. As an avid cupcake aficionado he has opted to explore changing cupcakes for leather... or have them both together. The cover shoot scared him... then aroused him... now he owns six pieces of leather.

Alex Canning entered the leather community in 2009, shortly after coming out to his family. It was the warmth, the acceptance and the support of his fellow leatherfolk that helped him along his journey to accepting who he was as a gay man. In 2012 he won the prestigious title of Mr Leatherman Toronto, and spent his year working hand in hand with his title-wife Tarna and his boyfriend Nathan to bring support and awareness to new kinksters looking to explore the life of leather.

Jeremy Feist is a comedian, writer and leather pup from Toronto, Ontario. He works as a salesperson over at Northbound Leather, and is responsible for the New Wave, a monthly event dedicated to educating new and young people about kink. When he's not doing nasty things for fun, he's usually at the gym or at home watching Gravity Falls.

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During the Inside Out Film Festival this year, I had the pleasure of watching a documentary film called "Folsom Forever." There was a lot of detail and explanation into how much the Leather and Fetish communities have given and supported others.

I will be honest, I've also found that "pit-bull" look on a guy quite attractive, but like most people, I've assumed that those wearing leather (or rubber, latex, etc.) are all part of a hard-core sex culture, that I may be a little too vanilla for. So I've always steered clear. However, with all the upcoming, and past (by the time this goes to print), leather and fetish events and festivals happening in Toronto... 
Jeremy Feist at Northbound dressed me in various outfits while scratching the surface of rules, regulations and etiquette.


Master Jack Pearce taught me that even just calling it "The Leather Community" pretty much just keeps it in a box way too small for all its diversity and wonder!


Now to touch on the subject that I'm sure a lot of you have been waiting and hoping to read about... the sex... let me say this:

"I got my drag name from a guy at a party in NYC. I wanted to start my name with Miss because it was classy. The meaning is kind of the definition of drag...a misconception."



So how does one write a mystery?

"Create a good plot with not too many loopholes." he tells me. "When I start, I know what was done, but not necessarily who did it. Halfway through, I realized the killer was not who I thought, but then I found a way to make it even more delicious. A mystery writer is always looking to create a maximum surprise at the end." Jeff is busy churning out books four and five of the series. Book three, called The Jade Butterfly. is due in February 2015. "It's quite a little assembly line my publisher has me on," he jokes. I mention the blurb on the cover, referring to him as 'the gav Margaret Atwood.' He laughs. "That references my ability to jump from genre to genre, as I do mystery, I suppose now is as good a time as any literary, comedy, and poetry." Busy guv.

Then there's young Joey Wargachuk, whose novel, The App of Time Travel, sold a staggering 3,000 digital downloads in its first month of release. "I hesitated to be part of this article because my book is not the least bit gay - well, maybe some gay drama, but no gay characters or plotlines," he tells me. I had a chance to catch up with Alec recently and find out what other projects he has been working


Boyd: What have you been doing over the least year?

Owen: Sophie, tell us about these shows. What are Owen: What feedback have you received? they about?

of WorldPride 2014, and both look at the relationship of photography and queer visibility, or queer identity. Fan the Flames is more about individual expressions of gender identity, and how photography has been used as observation, appropriation, and reinterpretation of images in a queer way. What It Means To Be Seen looks more at how photography has served collective ends, activist ambitions as well as more personal experiences.

Owen: What's the importance of displaying these historical queer images today?

Sophie: This idea of visibility, either to ourselves [as queer communities] through pictures of family and friends or to the public through pictures disseminated to the press by activists who felt that we needed our own voice, has played a key role in the way we have seen ourselves over the past number of decades. It reminds us how far we've come and also points out what there still is to be done.

Sophie: The feedback's been amazing. Gerald Sophie: Both shows were created on the occasion Hammond, one of the founding collective members of *The Body Politic* and a photographer for them for a long time, said to me how surprised he was that things have changed so quickly. I had a Ryerson alumn who graduated from the School of Image Arts fifteen or so years ago say to me that she never thought she'd see the day when we'd have this show at her home institution. A couple from Atlanta spoke about how they would never see this in the US, and how moved they were. In both shows, people are visibly moved, and some people were crying or getting choked up. I knew these shows were important to do, but through the feedback people have given me I've realized actually how important. I hope to be able to continue to work on this in the future.
